VIRGINIA HAMS ASSIST THE RED CROSS IN DC.

As I sit here trying to determine what to write about the efforts being put forth at the Pentagon disaster site, I'm struggling with trying to make what we do as amateurs sound important in light of the picture of the hole in the wall put there by terrorists.

Please don't get the wrong impression, the amateurs from several areas that are serving the Salvation Army, Red Cross and other efforts are doing exactly what they have been asked to do, provide communications and relieve those other

If you name a local agency, federal agency, state agency, then you would find someone working at the site providing support and/or direct manpower. From the FBI tactical team carrying machineguns to the State Police motorcycle patrol. From three star Generals to Army enlisted personnel, I talked with them all and the one thing they stressed is that they appreciated the outpouring of support and

There were volunteer search and as well as forensic teams searching the rubble that was being dumped on the parking lot in a roped off section of one parking lot.

A crane was holding a platform high above the damaged area, were two men were watching for anything that might be considered human, so the digging could stop and proper recovery be started.

Everywhere we went at the site, people stopped us and thanked us for what we were doing to help the effort. It

organizations of that responsibility. And not one amateur I met during my visit there was anything but at the ready to go where asked and stay as long as possible. "That is what we do".

The situation changed at the incident site almost daily and the volunteer organizations have to change to accommodate the ever-shifting requirements. Security has been significantly tightened and less and less people are being allowed in the incident area proper and security is even being heightened in the staging areas.

ARRL ARES Virginia started providing coverage for the Salvation Army from 5am to Midnight each day. But every day it changed, but the most recent need was for 3 locations 24 hours a day, with shifts from 4 am to Noon, Noon to 8 pm and 8 pm to 4 am. These changes are all made at the request of the DOD

love that was being expressed by their fellow Americans.

I even met an Army Major from California who had the weekend off at her base there and she asked her Commander if she could come to Washington and work as a volunteer over the weekend and report back as soon as she could on Monday.

I sat and ate lunch with a member of the FBI Tactical Squad who was wearing a bulletproof vest, black fatigues and carrying a submachine gun with laser sites. At the next picnic table in the tent was a one star Air Force General. Next to him was a couple of Army Corporals and next to them a three star General. The Salvation Army folks were constantly on the move doing this and that and carrying lunch, clothing, water, snacks, etc to anyone who asked.

embarrassed me a little because compared to what some others were doing, our jobs were a piece of cake. Did and does ham radio play a part where needed? A resounding yes is the answer.

But I further submit to you that we are just one part of a great tide of volunteerism and support that will be around for a long time to come.

We can be proud of what we do as hams and I personally have never been more proud to be an American.

Cameras were not allowed in the incident area, as you can well understand. But I did manage to get many pictures taken by others at the site and have added them to the website here.
